The most endangered leopard subspecies, the Amur leopard is native to the Russian Far East and Northeast China.

The population of Amur leopards reached a low point in the 1970s due to habitat loss, poaching and human-wildlife conflict with numbers estimated as few as 30 individuals.

Now the population is increasing due to the efforts of conservationists and governments. The latest estimates suggest there are over 100 Amur leopards in the wild.

WildCats Conservation Alliance works with zoos around the world to raise significant funds to support this population recovery through projects that reduce threats and encourage

safe coexistence with people.
